Early Intervention

- Early Intervention are services that students receive prior to the child's third birthday.
- Transition meetings are held typically 90 days before the third birthday to connect EI and school services.
- Students that qualify for services at this time meet the preschool handicapped classification (only classification for students that are age three and four).


School Services

- In order to qualify for school services, there must be a 33% delay in one area or a 25% delay in two or more areas.
- The five areas measured are physical, intellectual, communication, social and emotional, and adaptive.
- Most students qualify based on delays in communication (expressive language).


School Services Cont.

- There are thirteen school-age classifications.
- Specific Learning Disabled and Other Health Impaired account for more than 76% of students receiving special services.
- Approximately 7% of eligible students are identified as autistic.
- Approximately 8% of eligible students are placed in out-of-district placements.
- The cost for these fifty-three students is 3.5 million plus transportation.

Specific Learning Disabled

- A specific learning disability can be determined with a severe discrepancy is found between the student's current achievement and intellectual ability in one or more of the following area (Title 6A Chapter 14 Special Education 14-3.5)
- 1. Basic reading skills
- 2. Reading comprehension
- 3. Oral expression
- 4. Listening comprehension
- 5. Mathematical calculation
- 6. Mathematical problem solving
- 7. Written expression
- 8. Reading fluency

ADD/ADHD

""Other health impaired" corresponds to "chronically ill" and means a disability characterized by having limited strength, vitality or alertness, including a heightened alertness with respect to the educational environment, due to chronic or acute health problems, such as attention deficit disorder or attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, a heart condition, tuberculosis, rheumatic fever, nephritis, asthma, sickle cell anemia, hemophilia, epilepsy, lead poisoning, leukemia, 73

diabetes or any other medical condition, such as Tourette Syndrome, *that adversely affects a student's educational performance*. (New Jersey Administrative Code)

Least Restrictive Environment

• The Least Restrictive Environment is defined in the New Jersey Administrative Code (6A:14- 2.10): "each public agency shall ensure that: to the maximum extent appropriate, a pupil with an educationally disability shall be educated with children who are not educationally disabled; special classes, separate schooling or other removal of a pupil with an educational disability from the pupil's regular class occurs only when the nature or severity of the educational disability is such that education in the pupil's regular class with the use of appropriate supplementary aids and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily."

Least Restrictive Environment

- Randolph was one of a handful of districts affected by the Department of Education's settlement from allegations of noncompliance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).
- The district was cited for having too many preschool handicapped students outside of the general education setting.
- The district was required to develop an LRE Team.




